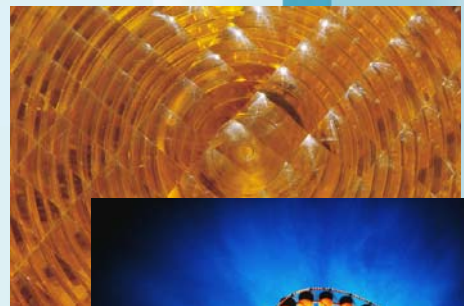

In the last five years, from 2000-2005, Texas added more than two million, or 9.6 percent to its population. In that half-decade, Texas had the second largest numerical increase, after California, and the 7th fastest rate of percent growth.

County census estimates as of July 1, 2005, suggest that Texas' urban and suburban communities continue to lead the state's growth while many rural counties are declining. The data also suggests that the relative role of the three sources of growth; natural increase, domestic migration, and international immigration varies substantially among the counties.

On the other end of the growth are the ten counties that are declining by more than 10%, according to the 2000-2005 census. Many of these are in the Panhandle and West Texas. These are: Stonewall, King, Throckmorton, Cochran, Culberson, Reeves, Knox, Borden, Upton and Reagan.

Natural increase continues to play a major role in the population change. In 62 of the 153 Texas counties with population increases, natural increase was the largest contributor to growth. Natural increase was negative (more deaths than births) in 30 counties.
